A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR AND TEACHER



Seeking Justice
He has told you, O mortal, what is good;
and what does the Lord require of you but
to do Justice, and to love kindness and to
walk humbly with your God?
Micah 6:8

The dictates of God, spoken by Micah the prophet, give us a clear perspective of what God expects of us. By the mouth of the prophet, God expects us to do Justice. That means that we cannot sit idly by and observe injustice without stepping up, speaking up, and doing whatever is necessary to right wrongs and correct injustices. After nearly five hundred years, America has finally been caused to face the systemic injustice on which the country was founded. This systemic injustice began with the genocide of the Native American Indian population and continued with the enslavement of more than 12 million Africans brought to this country for free Labor. Today, the rampant racism in this country extends to every person of color in this land. This nation has just now come face to face with the reality that ignoring the systemic racism that has been the order of the day in America has allowed our law enforcement system to be infested with white supremacists and racists. The justice work of this nation now must begin with eradicating this spirit of evil from the ranks of our law enforcement and radically reforming our policing system in this country.

This is not a new problem for America. It has existed since the first European settlers came to these shores with the misconception that they discovered something that was already here. People of good conscience in this nation must now unite in the struggle for justice that has long

been delayed. The conviction of Derick Chauvin for the brutal murder of George Floyd has sent an overdue message to the world that Justice can be achieved for America's oppressed populations.

We are living in a time when there will soon be no majority population in this country. How interesting that it has taken five hundred years for this nation to come to grips with the injustice it has historically perpetrated against its citizens of color, just in time for such a shift in this land. Our responsibility as believers is to do justice, just as Micah said, but to do it while loving kindness and walking humbly with our Creator. We must fight for the liberation of oppressed people anywhere and everywhere. In the words of singer, songwriter, and actor Leslie Odom, Jr., we must "speak now."

Mt. Zion is uniquely poised in this season to make our voice heard through our ministries of outreach, uplift, and advocacy. Amid a global pandemic, we have fed the hungry, supported minority entrepreneurs, provided for the educational needs of the children of our community, built bridges of community between the races, and advocated for Justice at every level. Our response to Micah's call has not stopped — it has accelerated.

I am excited to say we are drawing closer to a time when we will be able to safely meet together for worship, but we need the help of each of our members to do so. Our denomination has encouraged local congregations that it is advisable to reopen for public worship when 50-75% of church members are vaccinated. We have set the goal of 75% vaccination for ourselves before we join together for worship in our sanctuary. To reach that goal, we need as many Mt. Zion members as possible who can get vaccinated. Currently, vaccines are abundant in Ohio. In fact, many doses are going unused. Please arrange to go and get vaccinated as soon as possible so that we may meet our goal.

May is a month of graduations and culminations, and I want to take this time to celebrate all who are graduating from any academic or vocational program in 2021. Your work and accomplishment deserve recognition, and your church family is proud of you.

As we look forward to what is ahead, we know many things will be new and different. In some ways, however, they may be better than what we have done in the past. Let us embrace the new normal with hearts filled with anticipation of what God will do in, through, and with God's church in the days to come. As we do this, we will bring the attitude necessary for us to become the church that God desires and the world needs in this present age.

It wasn't a reality TV show, nor the latest episode of "Cops." It was live. It was uninterrupted and unscripted. There were no television commercials. A 17 year-old girl, who was going to pick up snacks from the corner store, had no idea that her life would forever change. She saw police, a man lying on the ground, handcuffed and pleading for help. Another Black man being harassed, arrested and endangered. For what?

Like any Generation Z teen, she had a phone. An iPhone. And as any teen would do, she pulled it out and started taping. She had absolutely no idea that what she was taping would be the most pivotal event of her life — and of the man who was lying on the ground under the knee of a police officer. Her phone captured everything. Most importantly, it captured the 9 minutes and 29 seconds of the last breaths the man, who she did not know, would take.

The 17 year-old teenager was Darnella Frazier. Today, because of Frazier, the world knows the dying man was George Floyd and the officer was Derek Chauvin. Like David, who took out his cling shot and picked up a rock, she slew Goliath. Frazier's phone camera changed the lens in which the world would view black lives.

Frazier's posting of the video on social media went viral — across the entire world — and people responded. in protest. Korea, Helsinki, Spain, Africa, England, and Tehran. These were just a few cities where millions of people came out to protest injustice in the United States. You name the place, there was a protest in support of Black Lives Matter. Enough is enough! How many more Black men and women would cry, "I can't breathe," in the hands of racist police officers?

With bated breath, the entire world watched as 12 jurors decided Chauvin's fate. The verdict was announced on Tuesday, April 20. Guily of all three charges - second degree murder, third degree murder, and manslaughter. Thank you Darnella Frazier for the videotape that provided justice for George.




Mt. Zion Members in the Spotlight


